MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Renee Lormé-Gulbrandsen



What an extraordinary time to be serving the community! While the start of our year was like every other since the inception of OBVS in 1977, the end of our fiscal year has been unprecedented. Running a virtual office, remote recruitment and onboarding of volunteers, and providing contactless services to our clients during the COVID-19 pandemic has been the result of operational innovation and intentional responsiveness for the health and safety of everyone. Through the successes, challenges and change in trajectory, our mandate has remained our guiding post as we continue to provide much-needed services to our clients with the heightened emphasis of mitigating isolation. Thank you to our staff, board of directors and volunteers for your many hours of service and unwavering commitment.

Up until March, and the change in focus to our COVID-19 Health Emergency Response, it was 'business as usual'. Our total number of clients had an increase of 11%, while our total number of volunteers increased by 9%. We continue to see growth in our client and volunteer numbers year over year. Regarding service provision, our clients received nearly 5,400 services, equating to over 8,000 hours of volunteer time. Drives continue to be our most vital service to clients at 37% of service delivery.

On the programming front, the Hop Aboard Seniors Shopping Bus continued successfully throughout 2019-2020. Delivered in partnership with Baptist Housing Society, the program offers trips to a local shopping centre for seniors living independently. It is an opportunity to be active through a light walk, shop for necessities or run errands, wrapping up with a lovely hour of connection with other clients and program volunteers. This is a beloved program by not only the clients but also our volunteers, and while the program is currently on hiatus due to COVID-19, we look forward to facilitating it again when we are able.

In the last annual report, I shared the exciting projects on the horizon for 2019-2020. I am proud to say they have all come to fruition. Our new website - www. oakbayvolunteers.org - launched in June of 2019. The website is engaging, informative and easy to navigate. The development of our new database was also completed, and with the interruption of COVID-19, we fully went into utilizing its innovative capabilities in response to running a virtual office. In August we mailed our clients the first edition of The Willow Tree - our bi-annual healthy living and healthy aging newsletter. These are a few of the many successes we had this year and it is thanks to the talented staff that we have met these goals.

OBVS is blessed to have a staff team that is knowledgeable, compassionate and collaborative. Our small team of four continues to drive administration, operations, volunteer coordination and client coordination. This year we said goodbye to Amy Penner as our Administrative Assistant and welcomed Britney Nguyen in the new role of Administrative Coordinator. Britney has an extensive background in nonprofit administration and programming, joining OBVS after a number of years with a social service agency supporting families in Alberta. Thank you to Ruth, Melinda and Britney for your continued dedication to our team and to our organization.

One of the greatest assets to OBVS is our roster of volunteers. On page 16 of this report, you will find a few of the nearly 200 volunteers that gave of their time and talents this year to the community of Oak Bay. It is with great disappointment that we are unable to host our Volunteer Recognition Event this year where we would honour the extraordinary milestones each of these individuals has reached in volunteering. To each of the award recipients - thank you for your continued service and congratulations! It is with gracious appreciation and admiration that I acknowledge the 35 years of service by Doris and Bert Dinsmore, along with 30 years of services, the community of Oak Bay and future volunteers is invaluable.

On a final note, I want to thank the continued support of our board of directors. A knowledgeable, committed board is a gift to any Executive Director, and I am thankful to the expertise each director has shared with me over the past year. I want to particularly acknowledge Out-going Chair Coline Neilson who dedicated five years to the OBVS board of directors. Thank you, Coline, for your sage wisdom and unwavering support to the governance of OBVS.

The year ahead for Oak Bay Volunteer Services will certainly be dynamic. While we have stayed the course, and continue to provide new and revised services in response to the needs of the community, COVID-19 has created challenges and opportunities like never before. Renee finished by thanking all funders and donors, and community sponsors and partners.







A Blossoming Connection: The Story of BJ and Lois

One spring afternoon, two friends shared their appreciation for the blossoming relationship they developed through Oak Bay Volunteer Services (OBVS). "I originally needed a ride to the hospital for an unplanned procedure", said BJ of her first contact with OBVS. Living on her own with adult children residing outside of Victoria, BJ looked to OBVS to find her a volunteer driver to get her to this much-needed appointment. Over the past seven years, BJ has received social phone calls, shopping support and drives to appointments, helping her live independently in the Oak Bay house she has called home for more than 60 years. "I haven't met one of your volunteers who isn't super special", she says.

An avid volunteer, Lois was looking for another volunteer opportunity that connected her to the community but also provided flexibility so she could travel and enjoy the other benefits of retirement. In 2018, Lois became an OBVS volunteer and was paired with BJ for social phone calls. The two connected right away. When BJ wanted support with weekly shopping, Lois was eager to assist. "I really

appreciate Lois. She is so accommodating. And we do laugh quite a bit", says BJ. "And I am totally here for her", says Lois.

Both Lois and BJ recognize the value of aging in place and remaining at home for as long as possible. "The most important thing of

all is to have the ability to make your own decisions and live life your way. That's my primary goal of volunteering", says Lois. BJ is a vibrant senior in the beautiful community of Oak Bay, and Lois along with Oak Bay Volunteers are committed to insuring she and others can continue to live independently with the help of free one-to-one volunteer services.
